OUR VISION

The Global Peace Foundation (GPF) is an international non-sectarian, non-partisan, nonprofit organization that promotes an innovative, values-based approach to peacebuilding, guided by the vision of One Family under God.

GPF engages a global network of public and private sector partners to develop community, national, and regional peacebuilding models through a framework based on universally recognized principles and shared values.

GPF recognizes that all religions and wisdom traditions share a commitment to uplifting human character and affirming transcendent ideals that can guide human conduct, foster peace, and advance human welfare. GPF also affirms that the family is the “school of love and virtue,” the environment in which every child comes to know his or her intrinsic value through the unconditional love of parents. The vital relationships in the extended family help to shape the child’s larger sense of identity and support the development of virtues that underlie all positive social relations.

The values formed in the family are meant to be practiced through a lifestyle of serving the greater good. A culture shaped by citizens who live in this way is naturally ethical, inclusive, prosperous and truly free.

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A MESSAGE FROM OUR CHAIRMAN



Over the last two years, the Global Peace Foundation's network of partners has been implementing groundbreaking models of peacebuilding across the globe, impacting the lives of people and communities in Africa, Asia, to Latin and North America. Many of these significant developments are captured in this 2018-2019 report.

Since its founding in 2009, the Global Peace Foundation has brought focus to the importance of universal principles and shared values in resolving conflict and forming the foundation for sustainable peace. That is why the Global Peace Foundation and its partners have been advancing a major civil society movement driven by the conviction that building a unified Korea based on universal principles and shared values is vital to peace and prosperity not only for the region but for the entire human family. The groundswell of activists from across the Korean peninsula and the diaspora who are owners of this dream and are taking action is truly remarkable. This movement is capturing the spirit of the March 1st Independence Movement and making significant progress towards realizing the dream of a unified Korea that benefits the world.

Since 2009, the Global Peace Foundation has expanded around the world and now is active in 23 countries. With unique focus on values that bind us together as a human family in a diverse world, GPF has engaged a wide spectrum of stakeholders that include international bodies, regional development organizations, provincial and local governments, business and philanthropic organizations, educational institutions, local community and volunteer organizations and generous donors.

This 2018-19 report presents some of GPF's key programs that are making a significant impact around the world.

VALUES-BASED PEACEBUILDING

Political and civil society leaders and leaders of the world's faith and wisdom traditions have a shared responsibility to transcend divides and work collaboratively to build ethical, just and cohesive societies. Agreement on universally recognized principles, shared values, and time-honored truths about the intrinsic value, dignity, and fundamental rights of all people is an essential means of countering violent extremism and enabling peaceful societies where human creativity and innovation can flourish.

In Nigeria, Peacebuilding workshops are engaging faith leaders and traditional rulers, as well as community, women and youth leaders. That is followed by practical applications to change attitudes, and concrete action plans to change behaviors.

With a grant from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security, the Global Peace Foundation is addressing urgent urban challenges shared by many cities, and is partnering with law enforcement, social service departments, and educators to advance a proactive approach for prevention of conflict and extremism, with an emphasis on youth leadership development.

Global Peace Foundation's PeaceHub Campaign is an important public awareness/educational initiative, uniquely designed to encourage communities to become safer, more inclusive and connected. The Community-based Peacebuilding Workbook offers targeted lessons for small groups to learn skills in peacebuilding and make an impact in their communities.

TRANSFORMING EDUCATION

Education is a gateway to success, yet too often graduates are left behind, without the requisite skills and competencies to succeed in the twenty-first century workplace. Access to the internet and technological literacy is a critical factor in lifting populations out of poverty and ensuring economic growth and prosperity.

GPF's Character and Creativity Initiative, Smart Workforce Readiness and LeapHub Science and Entrepreneurship Incubators seek to close the gap between the classroom and the workplace. Developed in partnership with national Ministries of Education in the Philippines, Kenya, and Paraguay and with leading IT corporate sponsorship, these initiatives are equipping graduates with essential character competencies and real-world skills.



YOUTH SERVICE AND GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

There are some 1.2 billion youth aged 15-24 years globally, and 4 in 10 people on earth are under age 25. Youth represent an enormous resource for progress, yet poverty, joblessness, and the appeal of extremist ideologies have frustrated the potential of youth to be a force for positive social change.

Youth driven by a noble vision can tackle many of the longstanding crises faced by humanity today with their energy, passion, and ability to dream beyond the current reality. Through its leadership and development initiatives, the Global Peace Foundation is committed to building a global network of moral and innovative young leaders to transform communities, nations, and the world.

GLOBAL PEACE CONVENTION

Advancing a Global Movement for Peace

Since its inaugural convening in Manila in 2009, the Global Peace Convention has become one of the premiere international gatherings of political and civil society leaders committed to advancing peace and human development around the globe. Heads of state and parliamentary leaders, corporate executives, influential clergy from diverse traditions, youth and women leaders, educators, and community and NGO leaders work together to define and address persistent problems of conflict and underdevelopment, with a unique focus on the values and aspirations shared by the human family.

The 2019 Convention held in Seoul, South Korea commemorated the centennial of the March 1, 1919 Independence Movement and explored the vision of the Independence Patriots, while calling for a renewal of those ideals in a new movement for a unified Korea that can be a model nation for the world.

Many other projects—such as All-Lights Village initiatives to support community development; entrepreneurship and self-sufficiency in rural regions; tree planting to counter desertification in Mongolia; and an information technology ‘boot camp’ in Kenya—



are being implemented by GPF volunteers and partners to address both immediate needs in communities and the enduring dream of all people for a world of peace and prosperity.

With the support and engagement of our partners and through our work on every continent, we strive toward a future that is peaceful and prosperous for all, based on our vision of One Family under God.

ONE KOREA GLOBAL CAMPAIGN

The division of the Korean peninsula is an exceptionally dangerous flashpoint that both threatens global stability and locks a population of millions in the North into poverty, isolation, detention and physical abuse. Diplomatic efforts have had little success to reduce tensions, lessen the threat posed by the North’s nuclear weapons program, or moderate the extreme human rights abuses perpetrated by the North Korean regime.

The Global Peace Foundation has advanced a robust and comprehensive approach to resolving the division of the Korean peninsula. Through international conferences and forums and grassroots campaigns in South Korea and among the Korean diaspora, the One Korea Global Campaign is appealing for unification based on the cultural heritage and historic experience and values shared by the two Koreas, while looking forward to a unified Korea that guarantees fundamental freedoms and human rights, promoting prosperity for all Koreans and the Northeast Asia region.

GLOBAL PEACE WOMEN

Women’s Leadership Culture

Today women are increasingly seen as essential resources for peace and development and are assuming greater roles as political, corporate and civil society leaders. Global Peace Women (GPW) has designed programs and initiatives that emphasize and uplift women’s unique and innate talents, engaging more women to become leaders for peace and development in the home, the workplace and in public life. GPW particularly honors women’s role in the family and seeks to expand such a role to wider society by recognizing and promoting women-led initiatives around the world.



VALUES-BASED PEACEBUILDING



There is an urgent need for a broad and inclusive vision that can bridge social and political divides and affirm our shared identity and common aspirations as members of the human family.

COMMUNITY PEACEBUILDING AND ELECTION VIOLENCE PREVENTION IN NIGERIA

Attacks by extremists, church and mosque burnings, and reprisal killings have taken the lives of more than 20,000 people in Nigeria. For six years, Global Peace Foundation (GPF) Nigeria has been engaging Muslim and Christian leaders and traditional rulers to reconcile religious and ethnic divisions.

Following a period of violence between predominantly Muslim Fulani herdsmen and predominantly Christian indigenous farmers in Southern Kaduna State, costing the lives of hundreds, GPF Nigeria organized coordinated mediation talks among leaders from both sides in 2017 and 2018. Leaders credited the efforts of GPF Nigeria for enabling Nigerians of different backgrounds to communicate and see each other as people, family members, and partners for peace.

In her remarks at a Dialogue Forum for security forces in May 2018, Hajiya Khadija Hawaja Gambo, Permanent Commissioner at the Kaduna State Peace Commission, commended GPF Nigeria for organizing the forum at the crucial time while Kaduna State was preparing for local government elections. She stressed that most of the people in Southern Kaduna are yearning for peace while maintaining that the time for us to live peacefully is now.

“What happened between us and the Fulani is painful,” said Comfort Simon, a native from Goska, “and I had resolved never again to love or have anything to do with them, because I lost my home and property completely. But the teachings I heard today have given me strength, and now, anywhere I see a Fulani person, I will be willing to lend a helping hand if I can.”

Sponsorship from the Robert Bosch Stiftung, Irish Aid and the King Abdullah bin Abdulaziz International Centre helped further strengthen community peacebuilding and peaceful elections so that community members could safely have a voice in their governance.



COMMUNITY-DRIVEN PEACEBUILDING

GPF's Community-Driven Peacebuilding Small Group Series is an important new tool for addressing conflict, division, and misunderstanding in increasingly diverse communities. This interactive program explores the root causes of conflict, principles and values that are broadly shared among the world's faith and wisdom traditions and provide the basis for peace, and case studies of community-driven peacebuilding. The program includes a video presentation, interactive questions, discussions on how the lessons can be applied, and action steps that can make a measurable impact in communities.



VALUES-BASED PEACEBUILDING CONTINUED



URBAN PEACEBUILDING INITIATIVE

Global Peace Foundation’s values-based peacebuilding work is preventing violence and building safer communities in the United States and globally. GPF’s two-year Department of Homeland Security-funded project in New Jersey was selected by the National Center for Counter Terrorism as a best practice for terrorist prevention.

This Train-the-Trainer project raised awareness about targeted violence and how to keep communities safe both on the street and online. The project engaged more than 3,000 police and community members to build connections and resiliency. Beyond its project scope, law enforcement stakeholders helped craft and then adopted curricula to train additional law enforcement, first responders and mental health professionals. The New Jersey Attorney General’s Office and law enforcement partners and program training host agencies significantly contributed to this successful project.

YOUTH LEADERSHIP TRAINING PREVENTS EXTREMISM IN TANZANIA AND INDONESIA

In an ongoing program to prevent youth involvement in violent extremism throughout Tanzania and East Africa, Global Peace Foundation conducts leadership training for students to build business and entrepreneurial skills to combat youth unemployment, a major factor of youth recruitment into extremist groups, and instill values of service to their community.

Unemployed, marginalized, and impoverished young men and women are more vulnerable to recruitment into extremist groups in Tanzania, which can offer economic incentives, social connections, and a sense of adventure and purpose. The training raises awareness of extremist recruitment tactics, how to report them, and how to address the issue with increasing accessibility of smartphones and the Internet. “Terrorists are using social media as a major platform to spread their ideology and expand their influence online,” said Dickson Kamala, a trainer with the program.

Reaching Millennials and Generation Z to raise awareness about extremism and community resilience was a focus in Indonesia where GPF programs reached almost 7,000 youth in six cities. The program provided diverse participants and over 80 partners a collaborative method to connect and build resilience in their communities.



ENGAGING KENYAN YOUTH TO PREVENT EXTREMIST VIOLENCE AND TRANSNATIONAL SECURITY THREATS

Transnational security threats (TSTs) have continuously jeopardized the political, social, cultural and economic landscape of the East Africa region and beyond, particularly because they target the youth as recruiters, recruits, actors and victims at various levels, said Siraj Fegessa, the Director of the Peace and Security Division at the Intergovernmental Authority on Development (IGAD), at a GPF-facilitated training workshop in Mombasa, Kenya, in September 2019.

The three-day workshop covered key thematic areas including transnational security threats; role of the youth in countering and preventing acts of terrorism and other TSTs; the process of radicalization; policies relating to counterterrorism and TSTs; principles of youth participating in peacebuilding; and Kenya's National Action Plan on TSTs.

GPF later presented training on youth engagement and PVE/CVE in Nairobi at the Insights Forum: Working with Religious Actors to Build Peaceful and Stable Societies, with support from the Tony Blair Institute for Change and Alliance for Peacebuilding in November 2019.



WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP CULTURE



Today's focus on individual freedom and economic development has led to a neglect of the family as an essential resource for peace and social welfare. Despite differences in personality and temperament, family members form loving and lasting relationships. Women have a crucial leadership role in building peace in the family, the cornerstone of healthy societies, nations, and a prosperous and ethical world.

Global Peace Women (GPW) is working to strengthen families, recognize and uplift the unique qualities of women and their contributions to the family, and promote women's leadership in broader social transformation. Through workshops, networking forums, advocacy, and women-led initiatives, GPW is empowering women in 15 nations to recognize and apply their unique capacities to promote a culture of peace in the home and beyond.

PEACE BEGINS IN THE HOME

Launched in 2017, the Peace Begins in the Home (PBIH) international campaign is a women-led movement that promotes awareness of each family member's indispensable value and responsibility to foster a culture of peace in the home through on-going programs, such as Nepal's Income-Generating Training Program, Uruguay's Conflict Resolution Program, and Nepal's Drug Prevention Program.

In 2019, the women's division launched the "Family Stories Series" annual campaign to encourage families to take small steps toward peacebuilding within their homes and communities. Over 80 heartwarming stories from 12 countries related happy family experiences celebrating the yearly theme "My Family's Favorite Memories." In 2018 and 2019, PBIH also conducted drug abuse prevention programs in schools and local communities in Nigeria, and financial management programs for single mothers in Uruguay.

'LIVING FOR THE SAKE OF OTHERS' AWARDS

Six women leaders who have served their communities and the nation were honored during a special 10th Anniversary "Living for the Sake of Others" award ceremony in Asuncion, Paraguay in November 2018. Some two hundred distinguished guests, including senators, congresswomen, government officials, judges, and business leaders, attended the nationally recognized awards ceremony.

The Paraguay government and Ministry of Education and Science also recognized Peace Begins in the Home as a campaign of national educational interest, approving the General Post Office of Paraguay to distribute a GPF postmark spreading the message of the campaign at home and abroad.

'BETTER THE BALANCE, BETTER THE WORLD' INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY 2019

In commemoration of International Women's Day in March 2019, some 1,000 women leaders and advocates gathered in commemoration of International Women's Day in March 2019 and in partnership with Inner Wheel Circle, GPW Philippines hosted some 1,000 women leaders and advocates gathered for a summit at the University of Makati in Makati City as a step towards building a more gender-balanced world.

GPW LEADERSHIP ACADEMY

GPW Leadership Academy empowers women to take more active leadership roles and expand their impacts in the family, community, and society. Applicants from over 13 countries developed leadership skills and creativity through capacity-building education on core leadership values, self-assessment and communication; service learning through hands-on service project implementations; and networking and partnership building to foster lifelong connections with GPW participants in global programs.

GPW KOREAN DREAM

The GPW Korean Dream projects are women-led initiatives that engage the Korean diaspora, as well as the international community, civil society, faith groups, and nonprofits to support efforts for peaceful reunification of Korea, rooted in universal principles and values. As of March 2019, GPW has implemented 22 projects, including development of educational materials and programs, art and service projects, and a fundraising project to advance the Korean Dream. These projects and initiatives serve as models of creative solutions to building peace and reunification in Korea and beyond.



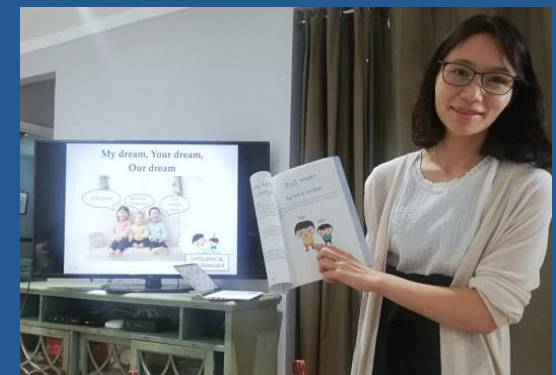

YOUTH SERVICE AND GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP



Through its youth leadership, service, and development initiatives, the Global Peace Foundation is committed to building a global network of twenty-first century moral and innovative leaders and engaged citizens committed to promoting peaceful and prosperous societies.

INTERNATIONAL YOUNG LEADERS ASSEMBLY

The annual International Young Leaders Assembly (IYLA) hosts university students, young professionals, and globally significant leaders at interactive leadership training programs in the United States and abroad. IYLA has provided leadership training to more than 6,800 participants from over 120 countries, with the 10-day flagship program hosting international delegates in New York, Philadelphia and Washington, DC.

In August 2018 and 2019, hundreds of young leaders representing 46 different countries convened at IYLA Global Summits at the United Nations headquarters in New York City, hosted by the UN Permanent Mission of Uganda. In Washington, IYLA participants convened at the U.S. Capitol for sessions of governance, and on International Youth Day held interactive forums at the World Bank in partnership with the World Bank Group's Youth to Youth Community.

SERVICE AND VOLUNTEERISM

The Global Peace Youth Exchange in Korea, Malaysia, Thailand and the Philippines enables aspiring leaders to strengthen qualities of character and leadership through service, forums, dialogue, and cultural exchange. In 2018 university students and representatives from the travel and tourism industry examined how the industry can contribute to achieving the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) at the United Nations in Thailand.

Global Peace Volunteers, a GPF project currently in Malaysia, Indonesia, Cambodia and Nepal, is an undergraduate program that stresses service and shared values to transcend national, cultural and religious differences.

YOUTH SERVICE AND GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP CONTINUED



GLOBAL YOUTH SUMMIT 2019 GATHERS THOUSANDS IN THE PHILIPPINES

More than 19,000 students and young leaders gathered at the MOA Arena in Manila for the 2018 Global Youth Summit on August 25. In 2019, the annual summit, now in its seventh year, hosted some 13,000 young Filipino leaders, providing space to share ideas and utilize diverse skill-sets, knowledge, and networks to effectively address persistent problems of today.

Prior to the 2019 summit, participating students developed and presented project ideas that can be implemented in their local communities in areas including education, health services, employment and entrepreneurship, sustainable tourism, civic participation, and child welfare. Dozens of entries were considered from across the country, and five outstanding innovative projects were awarded and highlighted at the summit.



COUNTERING VIOLENT EXTREMISM

In an ongoing program to prevent youth involvement in violent extremism in Tanzania and East Africa, Global Peace Foundation conducts leadership training for students to advance business and entrepreneurial skills.

The training raises awareness of recruitment tactics and common terms and methods used by extremist groups, including the exploitation of religious doctrines, fabricated “moral” arguments, fear of victimization and unemployment, or revenge. Increasing accessibility to smartphones and the Internet is also significant. To combat these methods, the program provides education on using social media, reconciliation initiatives to heal tribal grievances, and support for proactive participation in the community.

GPF Indonesia has also addressed outbreaks of violence, riots and suicide bombings by extremists through the creation of Bincang Damai Nusantara (Nusantara Peace Talks) in May 2018, a program organized by youth to increase awareness and tolerance of religious diversity and to mitigate extremist violence among youth. “This program is designed to create tolerance among young people, to get to know and understand each other,” said Program Manager Novan Dwi Andhika. “We also want to preserve the noble values of Indonesia by documenting and publishing those stories later.”



TRANSFORMING EDUCATION



Global Peace Foundation works with Ministries of Education, school systems and educators to develop in students the character, moral leadership and shared values needed to guide skills such as creative ingenuity, collaboration and communication. With these capacities, students can apply new knowledge and solutions that will propel humanity forward, while guiding them to be successful in all aspects of their lives.

Transforming education develops a workforce that drives employment and economic development, societal and political stability, and ethical societies free from corruption.

CHARACTER AND CREATIVITY

Global Peace Foundation's Character and Creativity Initiative (CCI) seeks to cultivate integrity, ethical online and offline conduct, creativity and problem-solving, and hands-on peacebuilding skills. In many countries of the world, this "values and skills" focus is often viewed as an antidote to corruption.

GPF Kenya's and Uganda's CCI schools have demonstrated a high level of innovation, entrepreneurship, and teamwork. CCI programs in the Philippines and Paraguay actively engage teachers, parents and community leaders to integrate values of respect and service and apply global competencies in real world projects.

In October 2019, Global Peace Foundation-Kenya in partnership with Oracle Academy and the Centre for Mathematics, Science and Technology Education in Africa (CEMASTEA), held a one-day "Code with Oracle" boot camp under the theme "Learn, Innovate, and Create," attended by public secondary school students and teachers to expand their technical and soft skills for the twenty-first-century job market. The camp incorporated Oracle technology, dividing students by groups for specialized mentorship from CEMASTEAs educators. Engineers and computer scientists from Oracle provided training on Java Fundamentals, Introduction to Databases, a tour of Oracle Apex and Alice, an open source, object-based educational programming language.

SMART WORKFORCE READINESS

Career opportunities favor graduates with global competencies and digital literacy, especially in the new frontiers of artificial intelligence, virtual reality, and supercomputing applications. GPF education programs partner with leading technology companies that provide hands-on training to equip teachers and students with technological skills, interdisciplinary learning and practical knowledge that prepare them for the twenty-first century workforce.

India has one of the largest youth populations in the world and a rapidly expanding technology sector. A two-day GPF forum for educators in June 2019 examined how advances in technology and artificial intelligence are creating unprecedented opportunities. While these developments are creating constructive changes all around us, ethical and innovative leadership will determine how these technologies can mitigate poverty and conflict and lead to positive change around the world.

A "Power the Next: Professional Teachers Capacity Building Workshop" hosted in Kampala, Uganda in November 2019, in partnership with the Uganda Ministry of Education and Sports, The Kafeero Foundation, Aspire Education Group and Black Sox, examined the economic, social and environmental challenges facing future graduates along with new job readiness skills needed in the era of the Fourth Industrial Revolution, Artificial Intelligence, automation and big data.



OUTSTANDING PRIVATE SCHOOLS IN KENYA AWARDED FOR HOLISTIC EDUCATION

Global Peace Foundation Kenya, the Kenya Private Schools Association, Standard Media Group, and Trends and Insights for Africa awarded private secondary schools in Kenya for their overall culture that contributes to the holistic development of students at the Great Places to School 2019 Gala. The Great Places to School Awards recognized 14 schools from some 250 entries based on criteria like governance, academics, safety and security, career development, and character and creativity.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND SCIENCE INCUBATORS

Providing guidance and space in secondary schools for highly motivated students to explore business and social entrepreneurship ideas, a Leap Hub is a dedicated after-school program with access to online tools to help students grow their enterprises. They are guided throughout the entire entrepreneurial process from identifying a need in the marketplace, creating a vision and mission statement, developing a business model, and branding.

Beginning in January 2019, select Leap Hubs students were accepted into a fully funded scholarship program at Moringa School in Kenya. Students acquired a basic understanding of coding and software engineering through a blended learning model presented by Moringa School and GPF program directors and educators. GPF Kenya also provided support for students from 80 schools across ten countries at the 2018 National Science and Technology Exhibition on July 5-6, 2019, organized by Young Scientists Kenya. Kenyan President Uhuru Kenyatta attended the exhibition, joined by community leaders, NGOs, and government representatives.



Adopt a Tree, Promote a Virtue

Maureen Waitthera, Astudent at Kenya's Buru Buru Girls School, a GPF CCI school



“We have various programs in this school that really help in promoting peace among not only the students but also among the staff.” Pointing to signs next to the trees with words like ‘determination’ and ‘consideration,’ Maureen says “each class has adopted a particular tree with particular virtues. These activities are promoting a sense of personal responsibility over the environment in that, if I know I have adopted a tree that promotes excellence, I will ensure that the tree has been nurtured well.”

“I do not adopt a tree alone; I do it together with my classmates and staff members. As I do that, it promotes a sense of mutual responsibility. Mutual responsibility promotes a peaceful coexistence between people. We don't want this conservation spirit to remain in Buru Buru Girls School. Let us all conserve the environment and ensure that we have a peaceful coexistence between each one of us.”



ONE KOREA GLOBAL CAMPAIGN



The volatile state of the Korean peninsula, the civil and human rights crisis in the North, and the unfinished work of self-determination for the Korean people make Korean reunification a major civil rights issue of today.

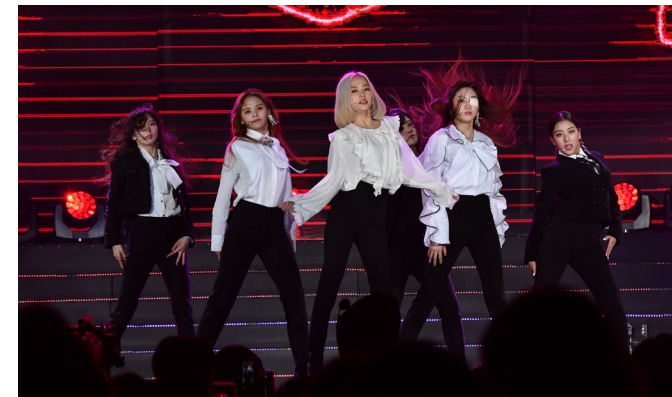
As a lead organizer of Action for Korea United (AKU), a coalition of more than 1,000 civil society organizations, the Global Peace Foundation has worked for reunification through convening international conferences of Korea experts, supporting diverse public education and humanitarian campaigns, and building a popular movement engaging K-pop stars, noted composers, and Grammy-winning music producers.

In 2018 global attention turned to the Korean peninsula with unprecedented summits between U.S. President Donald Trump, South Korean President Moon Jae-in and North Korean leader Kim Jong-un, and commitments from both North and South to step back from confrontation and the threat of armed conflict. The Inter-Korean Summit in April 2018, when the North Korean leader first crossed the DMZ into South Korean territory to embrace the South Korean president, was broadcast around the world. At the farewell ceremony, “One Dream One Korea,” a song composed as part of the GPF-supported New Era Unification Song Campaign, expressing hope of fulfilling the long-held aspiration of Koreans for a unified, free and independent nation.

Renewed relations have also raised serious concerns. At a forum held at the Carnegie Institution for Science in Washington DC, GPF Founder and Chairman Hyun Jin Preston Moon offered pointed analysis, calling on ROK and U.S. policymakers to consider “the importance of a strategic policy that has a clear end goal in mind—reunification—and works towards it steadily and systematically.” The goal of a unified Korea “separate from the legacy of the Cold War and based upon Korea’s shared cultural history,” he said, is not the work of governments alone but requires a broad civil society coalition.

ONE K CONCERT AND MARCH 1ST COMMEMORATION: KOREANS RALLY FOR PEACEFUL REUNIFICATION

Lawmakers, international dignitaries, K-pop artists and thousands of Koreans celebrated the centennial of the March 1st Independence Movement at Korea’s National Assembly Plaza on March 1, 2019. A landmark popular uprising for freedom and self-determination during the era of Japanese occupation, the March 1st Movement was the first non-violent civil protest against colonial occupation and inspired later movements for freedom and civil rights in India, the United States, and South Africa.

ONE KOREA GLOBAL CAMPAIGN CONTINUED



INTERNATIONAL FORUMS FOR ONE KOREA

The movement for reunification gained traction internationally in 2018 and 2019, with conferences in India, Japan, South Korea, Mongolia and the United States convening Korea experts, business leaders and elected officials. In Washington DC, Korea scholars and policymakers examined current events and opportunities for reunification at an Alliance for Peacebuilding briefing in February and a forum at the Carnegie Institution for Science in December. The forums noted growing popular and political support for the reunification process in South Korea, while also cautioning that reunification is fraught with challenges that require both broad civil society engagement and international political resolve.

In New Delhi, India, diplomats and civic, political, and cultural leaders addressed Korean reunification at a forum in October 2018, "Korea-India 20th Century Civil Rights Movement and Sustainable Peace and Prosperity", examining the Korean peninsula challenges in the context of India's nonviolent movement for independence from British rule.



KOREAN-LED, GLOBALLY SUPPORTED

International consensus led to the end of apartheid in South Africa and has contributed to progress in major areas such as sustainable development, poverty eradication, national independence and human rights. To build global consensus on Korean reunification as a path for peace, human rights, and expanded prosperity in the region, GPF has been a lead organizer of the One Korea Global Campaign, which has sponsored international art and media projects, and a movement to engage one million people worldwide through advocacy, education, volunteerism and social media.

INTEGRATING NORTH KOREAN DEFECTORS

GPF works with partners to connect North Korean defectors with local communities through various civic activities such as annual ping pong tournaments, kimchi making, forums and small meetups. For many defectors, life after their arduous journey from North Korea poses many new challenges. In South Korea, the support center Hanawon offers defectors three months of integration training to adapt to resettlement. However, according to Eun Sil Lee, “three months of short training is not enough to fully understand South Korea.”



ONE KOREA GLOBAL CAMPAIGN CONTINUED



A GLOBAL GRASSROOTS MOVEMENT

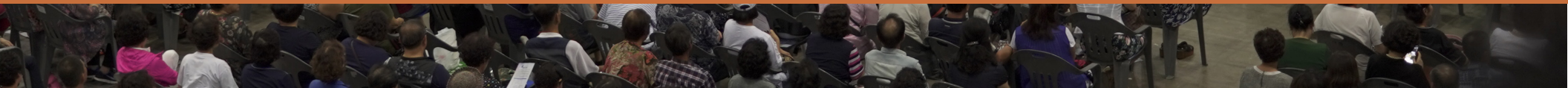
The Action for Korea United Festival and the Global Peace Leadership Conference on August 14-15, 2019, commemorating Korea's National Liberation Day, rallied popular and political support from around the world. Over 15,000 activists packed the Kintex Convention Center in Ilsang, marking a significant milestone for the grassroots civic movement to realize the Korean Dream of a peaceful, unified nation.





Korean Dream: A Vision for a Unified Korea

The Korean Dream is the enduring aspiration of the Korean people; a vision of a united, independent and free nation guided by the Korean ideals of *Hongik Ingan* that has charged the Korean people to “live for the greater benefit of all mankind.” The Korean Dream challenges the existing Cold War paradigm and hyper-partisan divide of left and right, reminding all Koreans of a shared historic, cultural legacy that spans five millennia. This vision is inspiring a global, Korean-led citizen movement for the peaceful reunification of the Korean peninsula.



GLOBAL PEACE CONVENTION 2019 KOREAN DREAM: VISION FOR A UNIFIED KOREA



INTERNATIONAL EXPERTS AND PEACEBUILDERS JOIN KOREAN CIVIL SOCIETY LEADERS IN SEOUL TO BRING FOCUS TO DIVIDED KOREA AND PEACEFUL REUNIFICATION

Korea experts, clerics, elected officials and non-profit leaders from 45 nations appealed for greater civil society engagement, respect for a Korean-led process, and emphasis on the character of a reunified Korean nation at the February 2019 Global Peace Convention, “Korean Dream: Vision for a Unified Korea.” The convention coincided with a national commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the March 1, 1919 Independence Movement, revered by Koreans as an expression of their shared aspirations to be free and united.

The three-day convening included an examination of comprehensive reunification efforts among youth and women’s organizations in Korea and abroad. Sessions on transforming education highlighted approaches to cultivating character competencies and skills needed to compete in the twenty-first century workforce. An International Forum on One Korea included the diverse voices of Korea experts from China, Russia, Japan, Mongolia, India, Great Britain, and the United States. “Peaceful reunification is paramount to Korea, its neighbors, and the world,” said former Chinese Ambassador to the United Nations Guo Fang Shen. “The responsibility rests primarily between the two Koreas, and they must do more to foster trust and cooperation.”

Discussions included realistic assessments of the conflicting interests, alliances, significant costs, and divergent worldviews of the two Koreas as well as perspectives emphasizing the 5,000-year shared history and heritage of the Korean people, the historic opportunity for breakthroughs in diplomatic engagement, and the enormous potential of a unified homeland that fulfills the long-held aspirations of all Koreans. Additional sessions on values-based peacebuilding emphasized religious freedom as a fundamental human right and presented a sobering, in-depth accounting of the human rights abuses and severe suppression of religious freedom in North Korea.

In his keynote address, Global Peace Foundation Chairman Hyun Jin Preston Moon said that “the philosophical ideal of Hongik Ingan [“to live for the greater benefit of humanity”] has always been a guiding principle throughout Korea’s tumultuous history in periods of crisis and national renewal. Representing our historic, cultural DNA, it allowed Koreans of every generation to connect to our heritage and define our future legacy.”



On the final day, Global Peace Awards were conferred on leaders in wide-ranging areas of impact who have significantly promoted peace, fostered an ethic of public service, and transcended boundaries of religion, ethnicity, and nationality in their personal and public lives.

GLOBAL PEACE AWARDS 2019

The Global Peace Foundation conferred awards on leaders in wide-ranging areas of impact who have significantly promoted peace, fostered an ethic of public service, and transcended boundaries of religion, ethnicity, and nationality in their personal and public lives. The awards were presented on February 28 at the Lotte Hotel and Conference Center in Seoul on Day 3 of the 2019 Global Peace Convention. Distinguished leaders were recognized with the following awards:

FAITH IN ACTION AWARD Pastor Kenneth Bae, imprisoned in North Korea in 2012 and released after 735 days of detention, is founder and president of Nehemiah Global Initiative, which supports North Koreans and defectors living in South Korea. He is the author of *Not Forgotten*.

PROMOTING A CULTURE OF PEACE AWARD Hyung-Suk Kim is a music composer, actor, and television personality. He has composed more than 1,000 songs for K-pop artists, the Olympics, and the Korean presidency. In 2015 he composed “One Dream, One Korea,” a song heard around the world during the final meeting of ROK President Moon Jae In and DPRK leader Kim Jong Un at Panmunjom.

OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD Ambassador Jargalsaikhan Enkhsaikhan served as the foreign policy advisor to the first democratically elected President of Mongolia. He has served as architect and the spokesperson of Mongolia’s nuclear-weapon-free policy.

LEADERSHIP IN STRENGTHENING FAMILIES AWARD Hajiya (Dr.) Amina Namadi is the founder of I Care Women and Youth Initiative in Nigeria. A businesswoman and philanthropist, she founded the Daru Na’eem Academy of Abuja and is a member of International Advisory Council of Global Peace Women.

INNOVATIVE SCHOLARSHIP FOR PEACE Dr. Florida Labuguen is founding president of the Philippines Society of National Service Training Program Educators and Implementers, where she has forged cooperation between communities, youth volunteers and some 500 educational institutions.

PHILANTHROPY AND CORPORATE CITIZENSHIP AWARD Hideo Kawabata is CEO of Fuji Suiso Kansha. He is a mentor of young entrepreneurs throughout Japan, and has expanded his philanthropic work to the Philippines, Cambodia, Indonesia, India and Korea.



GLOBAL PEACE LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE EAST AFRICA 2018



More than a thousand regional and international government, civil society and faith leaders from 16 countries addressed the critical role of leadership in developing effective models for advancing peace and prosperity in the Great Lakes Region and internationally at a Global Peace Leadership Conference in Kampala on August 1-2, 2018.

Uganda Prime Minister Dr. Ruhakana Rugunda said the conference theme underscored “the urgent call for countries to build consensus on responses towards pressing regional challenges guided by a shared vision, principles, aspirations, and innovative value-based approaches to peacebuilding, security and development.”

Highlighted during the conference were many of Global Peace Foundation’s emerging models for peacebuilding and development, including Mitigating Post-Election Violence in Kenya, Countering Violent Extremism and Youth Empowerment in Tanzania and Nigeria, and Entrepreneurship and Investment as Catalysts for Peace and Development.

The two-day conference was co-convened by the Republic of Uganda, the Global Peace Foundation, the Intergovernmental Authority on Development, the Inter-religious Council of Uganda, and the Private Sector Foundation Uganda.





WHERE WE WORK

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

INTERNATIONAL | GLOBAL SERVICE ALLIANCE SUPPORTS DEVELOPMENT THROUGH CROSS-CULTURAL SERVICE

The Global Peace and Development Service Alliance (GPDSA) emerged out of a convening of civil society and youth alliances at the United Nations Headquarters in Nairobi in July 2012 and Bangkok/ESCAP in October 2014, as well as massive volunteer responses in the Philippines to Typhoon Yolanda (2013) and the Nepal earthquake of 2015. Building on the foundation of these prior Africa and Asia convenings and service actions, GPDSA was inaugurated at GPF's Global Peace Convention in 2017 in Manila, Philippines. GPDSA has been taking action on the UN 2030 peace and development goals through dynamic youth social enterprise and creative partner action.

MONGOLIA | COMBATING DESERTIFICATION

Some 75 percent of Mongolia's land is affected by desertification, and hundreds of lakes, rivers, and other water sources are drying up, threatening traditional nomadic life. Global Peace Foundation Mongolia and volunteers have planted trees to impede further desertification and to revive pastures. In a recent project in partnership with the All-lights Project, volunteers have built fences to protect vulnerable young trees from the animals and sandstorms.

MALAYSIA | 'SAFE WATER, SAFE COMMUNITIES' PROVIDES CLEAN WATER TO VILLAGES

Global Peace Foundation Malaysia and Nestle Malaysia launched the Safe Water, Safe Communities project to provide clean water for people in five villages in Tasik Chini, Pahang by installing over fifty Swiss-designed water filtration systems.

GPF Malaysia's ongoing clean water and sanitation initiatives have benefited thousands of villagers since 2010 to counter the challenges of their remote locations, including health problems like skin diseases, diarrhea, and cholera.

NEPAL | COOKSTOVE PROJECT COMBATS INDOOR POLLUTION

In Nepal, 74 percent of households use open-fire methods for cooking, posing a serious health risk to the families, such as chronic heart and lung diseases. GPF Nepal's Cookstove Project provides families with the materials to build a stove that is designed to vent the smoke to eliminate the negative side effects of open-fire burning. The project has significantly improved the health of over a thousand families.

PHILIPPINES, MALAYSIA, KENYA, INDONESIA | PROVIDING SOLAR TECHNOLOGY FOR UNDERSERVED COMMUNITIES

The All-Lights Village project has served communities in the Philippines, Malaysia, Kenya, and Indonesia. The project has enhanced the livelihoods of underserved communities by providing sustainable solar technology. In March 2019, Global Peace Foundation installed solar technology for homes in Sion, Malaysia. So far, the project has given 834 people in 16 villages in Malaysia access to sustainable solar energy.

SOCIAL COHESION AND DEVELOPMENT

JAPAN | GPF BUILDS MUTICULTURAL BRIDGES

The annual Multicultural One Family Festival, organized by GPF Japan and key partners, fosters understanding and cross-community connections between Japan’s growing multicultural populations.

INDIA | ‘SMILE’ PROGRAM COUNTERS CASTE DISCRIMINATION

Caste discrimination takes the form of residential segregation, discrimination in labor markets, educational disparities, and overt and covert instances of untouchability. Global Peace Foundation India launched the “Smile” project in December 2018 with the Ideal Youth Health and Welfare Society to support the vulnerable Balmiki community in Karol Bagh, a district of Delhi. The project gathers students, youth and families from both high-caste and low-caste society for a values-based education program and joint activities. The program works to build social cohesion and trust, and transform attitudes and behaviors, creating opportunities for collaboration and community development.

CAMBODIA | GPF VOLUNTEERS SUPPORT LITERACY, ENGLISH LANGUAGE EDUCATION

Global Peace Volunteers in Cambodia are helping children develop literacy skills and a habit of reading, ensuring that students have access to books and dedicated space for learning. Global Peace Foundation Cambodia’s EnglishEd volunteers also teach basic English to children, help them with their homework and spark their interest in foreign languages and cultures. Global Peace Volunteers from surrounding universities are also making a difference through the GreenEd program, introducing students to environmental threats, demonstrating how to recycle and reuse products, and to identify solutions to environmental challenges.

BRAZIL | UNIVERSAL LANGUAGE OF MUSIC GUIDES VULNERABLE YOUTH

Leadership and Development by Music, a cultural project initiated by Global Peace Foundation Brazil in December 2016, has brought communities together in Goiania and beyond. The musical groups are largely made up of vulnerable youth in the community who receive scholarships from LEAM to attend the music program funded by the local and international donors. With bands, chorales, drumlines and more, LEAM involves teachers, community leaders, students and their families in creating music, developing moral and innovative leaders, and creating a sense of community as one human family.

GLOBAL PEACE FOUNDATION RECOGNIZED WITH UN CONSULTATIVE STATUS

Global Peace Foundation received a special consultative status from the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) at a Coordination and Management Meeting hosted by the UN council on June 6, 2019. GPF has also been partnering with the UN's Department of Public Information (DPI) since 2016, contributing to the development, implementation, and monitoring of agenda items agreed on by UN member nations.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PEACE

Established in 1981 by unanimous United Nations resolution, the International Day of Peace is observed around the world each year on September 21. The Day of Peace provides a globally shared time for people of all back-grounds to contribute to building a Culture of Peace. In 2018 and 2019 Global Peace Foundation chapters in India, Nigeria, Tanzania and Kenya joined local partners to commemorate the Day of Peace through community action, multi-faith prayer vigils, forums and peace festivals.

INDIA

In 2019 Global Peace Foundation India and Tears of Earth partnered to organize activities under this year's theme: "Climate Action for Peace."

NIGERIA

In Kaduna, Nigeria, over 1500 people observed the International Day of Peace. Global Peace Foundation, Interfaith Meditation Center, and other NGOs participated, bringing focus to the 2019 theme and the need to work together to find lasting solutions.

TANZANIA

Local leaders and stakeholders in Tanzania commemorate the International Day of Peace to strengthen the ideals of peace within and between nations. Partners included United Nations family led by UNIC Dar es salaam, Jane Goodall Institute, Youth of United Nations Association of Tanzania, Inter-religious Peace Council of Tanzania, Organization for Peace and Consensus, Internet Society of Tanzania, Center for Foreign Relations, Forum for Climate Change and others. Volunteers participated in climate action initiatives to reduce waste and air pollution.

KENYA

Global Peace Foundation Kenya joined the East African Ramgarhia Board, the United Religions Initiative, the United Nations Environmental Programme, the Interreligious Council of Kenya and other partners to celebrate the International Day of Peace 2019 at the Hindu Temple in Pangani, Kenya. The event commemorated the 550th birthday of Guru Nanak Dev Ji (1469 –1539), the founder of Sikhism, and was supported by the Kenya Interfaith Network, Mother Earth Network, All African Conference of Churches, Baha'i International Community, Unity Earth, and the Africa Media Initiative.
