Self diagnosis ----> Analysis and projection ----> programme information

Self diagnosis tools for citizens

Personal information dissemination for participants

..... access to available social services

Measuring social impact of risk resilience factors

..... PURPOSE to prevent social exclusion

Dissemination of the results of the analysis to the local authorities and partner organizations

Collaborative data collection

CCS does the analysis

Result is strengthened capacity

Access to data / analysis / results flows through local partner websites
